PRESIDENT'S AGM REPORT



PROFESSOR ADESINA SIMON SODIYA, FNCS PRESIDENT, NIGERIA COMPUTER SOCIETY (NCS)

President's AGM Report

It is indeed remarkable for me to welcome all our valued and distinguished members to the 2023 Annual General Meeting (AGM) of Nigeria Computer Society (NCS). I thank Almighty God for bringing us together once again to discuss the activities and growth of our dear society.

For the past one year, this National Executive Council (NEC) continued to put the society on the pedestrian of growth and development. This NEC remain committed to repositioning and refocusing NCS. We have been committed to enhancing members' interests and bringing all Information Technology practitioners under the umbrella of NCS. Indeed, the activities of the 15th National Executive Council have centered on improving the image of this society.

Distinguished Ladies and gentlemen, I wish to present the summary of the activities of this NEC in the last one year as follows:-

a. Advocacy, Publicity and Visibility: After a long time, a unique calendar and an introductory flyer were produced last year to further enhance the image of the society. These items have been widely circulated across the country.

We have redesigned the website of the society to showcase all the programmes and activities of the society. There have been significant improvement in content, quality and ease of navigation. This is a continuous process and I want to appeal to members to regularly visit the website for their evaluations and feedbacks. The monthly e-Voice magazine has been so regular to provide information about activities of the society and national news on information technology. We shall continue to make it more informative and educative.

Media engagements have been stepped to enhance the visibility of the society and respond national issues on Information Technology. The social media has been used more than before for enhanced publicity and engagements. The society's social media handles are are very active.

b. Finance & Administration: As a standard requirement, the auditor's reports of the society are now available online for the first time. The budgeting system and prudent financial management of this administration are still in place. We have continued to improve on the operations of the secretariat for better performance by providing necessary tools to support administrative and technical services to staff. Indeed, the secretariat is looking like a standard office and very conducive to work.

The new NCS Salary structure developed by this NEC has been fully implemented. A performance-based promotion and annual increase has been enforced. Now, secretariat staff are now upgraded as at when due. Staff now benefit regularly from loans as established in the reviewed handbook.

The cost of running the secretariat is rising daily because of the current economy realities. Since the last increase in the cost of PMS, we have approved two days' work-from-home for the secretariat staff to reduce their financial burden. The huge subscription debt is still there. As at today, the total subscription is place at about $\frac{N}{N}$ 500M. We have taken some measures to reduce this huge amount. The handshake between the portal and the accounting system has now been completed. This will really improve the financial management system of the society. It is obvious that we will be needing a professional accountant at this time at the secretariat.

c. Engagement and Good Governance: In the last one year, we have provided necessary supports to government activities in the area of IT development. Currently, NCS members are serving in many government committees and this continue to enhance NCS relevance in the IT ecosystem. Recently, we have had meaningful and successful interactions with National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA), National Identity Management Commission (NIMC), Economic and Financial Commission. Nigeria Financial Intelligence Unit (NFIU), Galaxy Backbone Plc., Federal Inland Revenue Servive (FIRS), National Communication Commission (NCC), National Population Commission (NPC). Head of Service of the federation (HoS), etc. We are still expecting response to the proposal submitted to INEC. This administration has also participated in many events organized by government agencies and other organisations.

Some other areas of engagements within the last one year are:-

- · Successfully challenged the proposed amendment to NITDA bill
- · Advised NDPB on the need to have IT professional on its board
- Requested TETFund to include more IT professionals on their national committees
- Advised INEC on the 2023 elections
- · Requested to be members of national committees of TETFund
- · Initiated collaboration with EFCC on how to fight cybercrimes
- · Advised the new government to appoint known IT professional as minister of Communication and Digital Economy
- Advised the new government to appoint known IT professional to boards of NDAs
- Made proposals to government on how technology can be used to solve national security challenges
- · Sent proposals to government on how IT can be used to enhance national development
- Presented a proposal to INEC on collaboration on a more efficient e-voting system
- · and so on.
- **d. Repositioning Chapters:** Today, I am really proud that we have active chapters in all the states in Nigeria. In the last few years, we have worked so hard to develop chapters and

bring them very close to the National Executive Council. Chapters have become reliable pivots of the society, helping us to take charge of IT Development in their various states We shall continue to support chapters and always accord them the necessary recognitions. Let me use this opportunity to sincerely appreciate all our chapters' chairmen for their commitment, compassion and unparalleled love they have shown in the last one year.

- e. Membership drive and Collaboration: One of the major goals of this administration is to run an inclusive and robust society. We have been encouraging many individuals and corporate organisations come under the umbrella of NCS. With over one thousand (1000) membership application yearly, it clear that our membership strategies are really yielding results. We have also instituted a unique corporate culture that is designed to enhance members' satisfaction and create more benefits for our corporate organizations.
- f. NCS/CPN Relationship: NCS and CPN had harmonious relationship in the last one year. We have joined forces together in realizing the statutory mandates of the two bodies. We are working together on skill development, membership registration and general regulation of the IT industry. I wish to use this opportunity to appreciate the current President and immediate past President and Chairman of council (CPN) for thier unalloyed support to Nigeria Computer Society.
- **g. Relationship with NACOS:** We now have enhanced relationship with the student wing. I wish to inform you that the president of NACOS now sit on the NEC of NCS as observer as required in the constitution. We have participated and supported some NACOS programmes in the last one year. We shall continue to do our best to promote and support NACOS activities and programmes.
- h. Innovation, Research and Development: The NCS Technology Innovation Development Fund (NIDF) introduced three years ago to provide support for young innovators, startups and researchers in the field of Information Technology/Computer Science is still on course. We have been using the fund to run the Technology Innovation Development Programme of NCS. On behalf of the society, I wish to appreciate Chief (Dr.) Leo Stan for providing the seed fund for the programme. The first set of innovative solutions from the TIDP was launched on the 14th July, 2023. The second edition of the programme has commenced with another four innovative ideas.

We have never failed at publishing the yearly editions of our journal as scheduled. The journal distribution strategy adopted has made NCS journals to be available in the libraries of many institutions. We now have now profiled the contact information of Librarians of most tertiary institutions in order to foster better relationship and ensure wider distribution of NCS journals. We have also initiated efforts toward indexing the two

journals of the society – Journal of Computer Science and Its Applications and Journal of Information Security, Privacy and Digital Forensic.

Some of you must also be aware that NCS now has a Digital Library that is hosting all our previous and current journal articles and proceedings. This is one of our promises to members and we have been able to realise this. Members can now have free access to e-copies of all articles published by NCS.

You will recall the current NEC has also introduced two annual major events;

- 1. Artificial Intelligence and Robotics Summit: Two editions have been held. We appreciate Nasarawa and Plateau State chapters for facilitating these. We also wish to thank the governors of two states for their huge donations towards the success of the two events.
- 2. Cybersecurity Forum and Workshop: Three editions have been successfully executed. The major sponsor of this event has been Federal Inland Revenue Service (FIRS). We appreciate the current chairman of FIRS for the constant support.

We have two new partnerships on innovation and Research:

- a. World Bank: Establishment of Innovation Hubs in Nigeria. This will kick-start with Edo State
- b. Bill & Bellinda foundation and OctaveAnalytics: Collection and utilization of geospatial data in Nigeria
- c. Tetfund: Involvement of members in Tetfund Research committees
- i. NCS Building: Work is still ongoing on the NCS Centre of Excellence (building) in Lagos. Roofing, cementing and skidding have now been completed. The major determination of the present NEC was to complete the building. We still need about-N450 million and I believe that the new NEC will rise up to the challenge. I therefore appeal for the support of notable individuals and organizations to complete the building in due course. The Chairman building committee will be presenting a comprehensive building committee report at this meeting.

I wish to mention here that the CEO of Smartcity Resort Centre, Mr. 'Demola Aladekomo, has given NCS some plots of land at his smartcities in Ibadan and Osogbo. We appreciate his so much for this gesture.

j. Education and Scholarship:

The 2023 Wizkid and tertiary competitions have concluded. The winners have been announced and adequately rewarded. Our collaboration with Cisco and Oracle Corporation to provide modern skills in coding and other emerging technologies to members of this society is still on. We have scheduled other set of training programmes towards the end of this year.

We discovered that this country still needs more practical professional software engineers to support the implementation of creative ideas and enrich the fortune of this nation. It was also discorvered that the few software engineers we have are leaving this country for greener pastures in abroad. Consequently, NCS and CPN have established Code for Prosperity Academy (CfPA) for the making and development of professional software engineers/ application developers needed for building world class innovative solutions. The academy is expected to start full operation in the next one month.

One of the major goals of NCS is to develop Computer Science / Information Technology education at all levels. Apart from the Wizkid national competition, NCS had no nationwide educational programmes for pupils in secondary schools. The TechMind educational programme initiated about three years ago was finally launched on the 20th March, 2023. The aim of the programme is to provide basic skills for kids and pupils in coding and robotics. TechMinds programme was designed to be implemented at level of chapters. We expect chapter chairmen to lead the full implementation of this programme in their states.

I wish to inform AGM that we are yet to receive the 2023 scholarship fund from Jim Ovia Foundation because the process is yet to be completed. We are sure that the fund will soon be released. We thank Chief Jim Ovia for constantly providing the fund in the last seven years.

k. Board of Trustees: I wish to inform you that the National Executive Council (NEC) has almost concluded the appointment of board of trustees of Nigeria Computer Society as required by law. The last constituted Board of Trustees of Nigeria Computer Society (NCS) is no longer valid and unacceptable by Corporate Affairs Commission because it was done over twenty years ago. This has also affected the status of NCS with CAC and ability to have meaningful relationships with other organisations. Last year, NCS status with CAC was made inactive because of the issue of board of trustees and inability to file in returns several years ago.

Based on recommendation of Ethics and Disciplinary Committee, Mr. Aliyu Musa Aliyu has been suspended as a member of Nigeria Computer Society indefiniately.

m. Election and Transition

This current NEC is coming to an end in the next one monthM. We have carefully followed our laws on transition to conduct free, fair and creditable election. NEC has provided the electoral committee with the needed resources and supports for smooth conduct of the elections. We are aware that some of our members are aggrieved on some of the actions taken by electoral committee. As president, I take all responsibilities. I want to appeal you all that we should all continue in love and build unity among members.

It is clear that we need to review the electoral guidelines and make some of the provisions of the constitution because of the possible different interpretations. I believe that this will be one of the major assignments the new executive will embark upon.

n. International Partnership

As the Nigeria representative, I attended IFIP General Assembly in Lillie, France between 20th and 22nd September, 2022 after a long time. Our participation provided a very good opportunity re-establish our partnership with the international body.

The current NEC has resuscitated our membership and we are now very active in IFIP. I wish to inform members that IFIP has fourteen (14) Technical Committees, listed as follows:-

3.2 Ethics and Disciplinary Committee (2022-2023 Reports).

The committee meets regularly for meetings, online and at times through the Committee's WhatsApp group chats.

Within the year in review, The Ethics and Disciplinary Committee of the Nigeria Computer Society were requested to review the NCS Code of Ethics and Standards vis a vis the National Policy on ethics and integrity document which was introduced by the Federal Government of Nigeria.

The above task was completed. Members can go online to view the NCS Constitution as amended <u>https://www.ncs.org.ng/wp-content/uploads/2023/01/The-Constitution-of-Nigeria-Computer-Society-NCS-2022.pdf</u>.

In the year, there are issues brought to the attention of the Committee.

- 1. Constitutional Crisis at ISPON: The ISPON President was advised to conduct an election to elect new Executive members to run the affairs of the Association in the next 2 years. This was adhered to, and the issue was resolved immediately.
- 2. Also, the Code of Conduct was reviewed.

 The Ethics and Disciplinary Committee of the Nigeria Computer Society received a letter from the Executive Secretary captioned – Suspension of Prof. Aderounmu as a member of NCS National Executive Council (NEC)

After a careful study and deliberation of the content of the letter in line with the NCS Constitution (As Amended in July 2022), the committee came up with the following resolutions:

- I That the suspension remains until he is prepared to let NEC know his grievances.
- ii In addition, all rights and privileges attached to his office as IPP should be withdrawn immediately.
- lii He should be given one month within which to come to NEC or Ethics committee to air his grievances or stand the risk of being expelled from the society.
- i. Going forward, we suggest that all disciplinary/unethical matters should be first investigated by the Ethics committee, who will then make recommendation(s) to NEC for decision making.
- 4. Report on Forgery Case. involving an NCS Member:

The Ethics and Disciplinary Committee of the Nigeria Computer Society received a letter from the Executive Secretary with the above heading.

After careful study and deliberation of the content of the letter in line with the NCS Constitution (As Amended in July 2022), and the code of ethics and professional conduct document, it was decided that the accused be invited for questioning by the Committee. (This was done online)

The Accused was questioned, and the following were the findings of the committee:

- The Accused person confirmed that he committed the offence as stated above.
- He scanned a copy of the Certificate he had and cloned same for the use of his colleague who was not a member.
- He collected the sum of N30, 000.00 each to produce the certificate for two company totalled N60, 000.00.
- · He was the PRO of Kaduna State Chapter between 2019 and 2023.
- The Certificate was cloned in 2021 for the use of one Mr. Nafiu who was not a member of NCS as at the time of the forgery; Mr. Nafiu was not a member of NCS as the time. He only became a member in 2022.
- Mr. Nafiu has since regularised the registration of his companies with NCS.
- The accused was detained by the Police for 2 days and later discharged on bail.
- · He said that was the first and last time he ever cloned NCS certificate for anyone.
- He claimed to have carried out the act on his own (No staff of NCS or member assisted him in the process)
- The committee was informed that he tried to avoid being arrested and that the Chapter had to engage the services of a private detective before he could be arrested.

At the end of the meeting,

The following were the recommendations of the Committee:

- a. Certificate Forgery is a criminal offence.
- b. His membership with NCS should be withdrawn.
- c. NEC should advice CPN to deregister him if his name is on the register of ComputerProfessionals.

- d. Secretariat should publish a disclaimer on him on national dailies.
- e. Secretariat should put in place measures to prevent feature reoccurrence.
- f. BPP and other organisations should be encouraged to carry out certificate verifications before contracts are awarded.
- g. Kaduna Chapter should be advised to leave the police case open with the police and not to pursue it to avoid wasting their time and resources.
- 5. A case of an elder of the Society, indicting the President and members of NEC to account for the =N100 Million Naira donation to NCS in support of the office project.

Mr. Rogba Adeoye was invited to a meeting of the Ethics & Disciplinary Committee – He refused to show up for the meeting and wrote a letter saying that the Ethics committee should consider his health in determining the matter.

He also said his lawyer can be contacted for further communication because of his health condition. The issue was reported to NEC for their input on the way forward.

3.3 Publicity, Events and Trade Services Committee (2022-2023 Reports)

The Committee participated alongside the Conferences Committee in creating awareness for the 2022 International Conference at Abeokuta which we can all attest to the level of awareness it had and resulted in a large attendance and participation.

- The Committee immediately hit the ground running in preparation for NITMA 2022, the fliers for the event and call for nominations for our different awards and various activity plan in preparation for the event went on smoothly. And we had an eventful and successful NITMA 2022, it recorded improve attendance.
- In the year under review, NITMA recorded Class, Beauty, and Elegance by the Introduction of first ever NITMA QUEEN which was unveiled at the 2022 NITMA.
- The Committee was Consistent in the production of e-voice the NCS online newsletter(bulletin).
- The Committee produced NCS 2023 table calendar which was used for advocacy and awareness creation. I must commend the President and this esteem NEC members for this great innovation, which went a long way in advertising the society, introducing the society, its actives, and its various stake holders to the public.

3.4 Education & Manpower Development Committee:

3.6 Conferences Committee.

Conferences Committee Report

The conferences committee is responsible for planning, implementing, monitoring, and controlling every aspect of NCS-sponsored conferences, including symposiums/seminars and workshops. The committee

collaborates closely with relevant stakeholders, including the Innovation, Research and Development Committee, Publicity, Trade and Events Committee, and selected volunteers to perform its duties.

To realize the vision of *making the NCS conferences a value-packed and connecting point for all members and relevant stakeholders* in the IT sector, the committee had a series of meetings, including ten virtual and two physical meetings, to review, plan, and implement strategies for a successful conference for the year under review.

This series of meetings has led to various initiatives

Implementation of International Conference on Smart, Secure and Sustainable Nation

The 2022 international conference held at Abeokuta was judged to meet the attendees' expectations, leaving a lasting positive impact on participants and the IT community. It was our second Hybrid conference, providing opportunities to improve members' participation irrespective of location.

The Hybrid conference took place at June 12 Cultural Centre, Kuto, Abeokuta, Ogun State, Nigeria, between 2nd – 4th August 2022, with 1164 participants (physical and online), making it a 20% increase above the 2021 conference held in Uyo. The 3-day event leveraged technology tools for live streaming for our global participants as they constitute 10% of participants while 90% are within the country.

The theme, **"Smart, Secure and Sustainable Nation, S3N,"** was chosen to address the burning issues facing the Nation regarding building intelligent technologies for economic growth. The conference presents strategies for harnessing the opportunities created for stakeholders in the digital economy. Unsurprisingly, other stakeholders within the country make the topic their point of discussion shortly after our event, thereby contributing to the federal government implementation roadmap.

The conference had global thought leaders, policymakers, members of the press, and students. The Speakers and presenters presented rich papers logically across five plenary and six parallel sessions. The conference also provides participation of other activities at the event include a visit to Obasanjo Presidential Library, a visit to Olumo Rock, NACOS night, a banquet dinner, and a presentation of awards to individuals and chapters that significantly contributed to the conference's implementation.

Post Conference Activities

Upon completing the conference, the committee developed and circulated the Conference Communique to all stakeholders. We documented the lessons learned for historical purposes and sent letters of appreciation to all our supporters, including sponsors and partners.

1. 2023 conference

Following the interest of the Government of Bauchi state through the State Chapter executives, the NEC decided to have the 2023 conference in Bauchi as it will promote social integration and

After due consultation, our team developed the theme "**Communications and e-Systems for Economic Stability**" to consider broad social, economic, and technical challenges in communication infrastructure, processes, and our Nation and discuss solutions that could respond to evolving societal challenges. Planning a hybrid conference can be challenging, but 2021 and 2022 provided a good experience and gave us an advantage. The focus of **NIWIIT** remains the advancing the use of Information Technology amongst Nigerian women through networking, mentoring, collaboration, and capacity building programs. NIWIIT has Inducted between 2021 and 2022, a total of Ninety-One (91) new members, some of whom are of the Professional cadre, meaning they are also NCS members.

During the year a committee was set up review NIWIIT Byelaws. Happy to announce that the Byelaws 2022 is now what guides NIWIIT as an interest group.

On 8th March 2023, NIWIIT joined the rest of the world to celebrate International Women's Day (IWD). NIWIIT celebrated the day with an online webinar presentation on the theme with 3 impactful speakers, a very successful event.

During 2022 NIWIIT embarked on another cohort of the EmpowerHer Digital skills Training Initiative, in Lagos state. This brings to a total of over (2000 applications received & shortlisted for the Training, four hundred (400) were trained on the Telegraph group. Out of which, 162 obtained Microsoft certifications. Conversations have commenced, in Osun and Kaduna State Chapters for EmpowerHer Digital Skills training for NYSC females. This training should be progressed within the next few months. A formidable collaboration has been created; an Initiative of NIWIIT, in partnership with Microsoft.

The Girls in ICT initiative took place in all NIWIIT State Chapters. NIWIIT State Chapters have continued to be vibrant. The interest group has established her state chapters and inaugurated their respective state EXCOS in Seventeen states of the federation. The states already inaugurated by NIWIIT are: Abuja, Akwa-Ibom, Benue, Gombe, Imo, Kaduna, Katsina, Kogi, Kwara, Lagos, Edo, Ekiti, Enugu, Ogun, Oyo, Osun. The plan is to include Anambra and Bauchi State Chapters on this list and breath fresh life into the less vibrant state chapters.

Girls in ICT Day continues to be a medium to mentor the young Nigerian girls on IT. Other activities of our chapters, include webinars and workshops, thereby increasing the empowerment of our members with various aspects of IT.

NIWIIT held its 2^{nd} Edition of Undergraduate Females in IT Quiz. (UFiT) targeted at undergraduate female in IT. From inception to date, we have had Six hundred & eighteen (618) registered for the quiz across the

nation. The quiz curriculum covered; basic knowledge about IT, including hardware, software, networking and internet technologies and national IT Industry bodies such as NCS and NIWIIT.

Early in 2023, we started another first, the NIWIIT Webinar series. The aim is to further help the members of our interest group to empower ourselves by sharpening skills and widening our capabilities for a digital world.

During January 2023, NIWIIT, represented by its President, was invited to be part of a consulting group that birth the Women in ICT Zimbabwe (WICTZ). The president gave the Keynote address at the March 2023 Launching of WICTZ in Zimbabwe event.

We at NIWIIT are fueled with passion to see vision stay a glow. Thank you.

5.0 REPORT FROM ZONAL CORDINATORS

5.1 South West Zonal Coordinator

The Nigeria Computer Society (NCS) South-West Coordinator and Representative at the CPN Council is charged with the responsibility of supporting the growth of the six state chapters of Nigeria Computer Society within the region. On application for this position, I set the following as my target for accomplishment:

- i. To strengthen the six state chapters via harmonization
- ii. To support the interest of NCS with respect to enhancing Membership strength
- iii. To organize Webinars to promote IT Education
- iv. To expand the CPN induction of Computer Science Graduates within the South-West region.

This report chronicles the giant steps I have taken in achieving these. Within the last two years, there abound incontrovertible evidence that a new dawn has broken forth in the six state chapters (Ekiti, Lagos, Oyo, Ogun, Ondo and Osun) of the South-West Region of NCS. We started the year with chapters presenting their calendar of activities for the current year and this birthed the roadmap for us, subsequently. As strategically coined out in my first term in office, the vision of the NCS South-West Region, remains as **"Harnessing IT Potentials for Productivity and Growth"**.

The following are the activities embarked upon within the period:

i. Constant Monitoring

There was active engagement with the individual state chairman from time to time. The South-West *WhatsApp* platform, which has some members of state executive council onboard, has been such an interactive forum which focused on the growth of each chapter. As a result of this effort, the Oyo and Lagos State Chapters recorded significant improvement, while Ekiti and Ondo equally joined the trail at the beginning of my second term. Our *Tweeter* handle **#southwest4ict** and the email address <u>southwest@ncs.org.ng</u> were judiciously utilized.

I attended (physically), the meetings and events organized by Ondo, Ekiti, Oyo and Lagos Chapters one time or the other not leaving out Ogun State Chapter. This was just in a way to encourage them.

ii. Fostering Leadership Skills

In ensuring that members are up-to-date in their professional callings, an executive retreat tagged " **Unraveling the Potentials of Leadership**", was organized for the South-West State Chapter Chairmen and their executive members. This event, was fully self-sponsored, had multiple objectives and the key ones are: (*i*) sensitization of leaders on membership mentoring; (*ii*). building strategic structure for corporate membership management; (*iii*) development of strategies to bridge the gaps between academia and the industry players and (*iv*). Improvement of IT professionalism. The event ended successfully with a charge to all SW State Chapters, to equally organize a program for their chapter members and the community at large.

Another leadership seminar also held with the theme '**Revitalizing the State Executive Elective Positions'** aimed to ensure a reliable succession plan is in place, on expiration of the current tenure.

Every end of the year equally witnessed **A Wrap Up program**, where unachieved goals are tabled for discussions bothering on issues or challenges faced, and probable solutions, which could be applied to future activities.

iii. Promotion Of IT Education

One of the key mandates of Nigeria Computer Society is to promote IT education, which equally, is in line with my vision. Training that aligned with emerging technologies and addressed in meeting up with global standards were strategically held. Listed are the training events with descriptions:

a. A virtual seminar on **"Staying Safe on the Internet"**, was organized by a consortium of leaders of State Chapters, whereby each Chairman had designated role. The event held virtually (*via Zoom*) in the month of June 2020, with about 315 participants from Nigeria, UK, USA, Korea, Malaysia and South Africa. Commendable feedback was received from the participants. A communique detailing guideline to keeping safe on the internet was released to the public and published on the NCS websites. At the end of this seminar, some participants were eager to be members of the society and they were assisted in processing their applications.

b. A three-day training titled **Building Your First Mobile App with Flutter** was held on the 19th to 21st of August 2022 with a pre-training held on the 12th of August 2022. The focus of this program was to enlighten the state executives on the strategies to deploy in organizing short-duration virtual programs and to train all participants on accountability. It should be noted that the income generated was shared with the six state chapters.

A leadership seminar was held titled **Reminiscing Your Leadership Vows to Becoming An Inspirational Leader.** A speaker was invited from the Oil & Gas industry to provide a different perspective to rendering service to the society. With participants spread across the country, it was a rewarding experience for all, particularly the state chapter leadership, to learn ways to keep the NCS flag flying in every domain. The meeting recordings and presentation packs / resources were shared with attendees on request.

iv. Election of New States' Executive Councils

I'm delighted to report the successful transition of offices in Ogun, Ekiti, Lagos, Oyo and Ondo State Chapters during my tenure. The inauguration ceremonies for these new executive members were held, while the planning is already in progress, for Ondo and Ekiti State Chapters at the next International Conference. A lot of effort was put in place to encourage members to take on leadership roles in other state chapters especially the tenured ones.

v. Sensitization of Graduates of Institutions for CPN Induction

The office of Southwest State chapter was envisioned to expand the strength of graduate inductees to CPN by visitation to the institution induction ceremonies. There was a close monitoring of the already registered institutions for continuity most especially in Ogun State while Oyo State Chapter SEC also pursued this strategy by visitation to institutions within the state, for orientation of the students.

vi. Activities in Each Chapter

Activities within the state chapters have been stirred up, most especially the newly inaugurated state executive councils. These are well monitored to ensure they hold meetings regularly, going on advocacy visits, as well as having seminars, and other impactful programs that would enhance the growth of each chapter.

Confidently, two state chapters namely: Lagos and Oyo States, now have series of activities running compared to previous experience. This was made possible through the orientation and various engagements during my tenure.

On this note, I wish to humbly inform that during my first term in office, the Ogun State Chapter, laid the foundation of the secretariat building, which I was fully part. I can confidently report that the highest number of inducted fellows was presented by the Southwest zone during my tenure.

Appreciation

I wish to seize this opportunity to appreciate all past state chapter executive council members for their strong dedication, loyalty and commitment towards the achievements recorded during their tenure.

I equally appreciate all stakeholders that made the office worthwhile and made all the accomplishments possible. My deepest appreciation goes to the outgoing Deputy President, Dr. Aliyu Sirajo, for his unrelenting support during the period. It is my prayer that the performance of the next administration zonal coordinators would surpass mine.

On this, we extend our sincere appreciation to the then Honorable Commissioner, Dr. Jane Ogoma Aja, for her support and foresight in facilitating this donation. Her commitment to fostering the growth of the IT sector in the State is evident in this gesture, and we are grateful for her continued partnership and encouragement.

Monthly Webinar on IT: As part of our commitment to fostering knowledge sharing and professional development, the Benue State Chapter of the Nigeria Computer Society organized monthly webinars on various topics related to information technology (IT). These webinars served as platforms for experts to share their knowledge and insights with our members and the wider IT community. The webinars covered a wide range of topics, including cybersecurity, artificial intelligence, data analytics, and emerging technologies. The response from our members and participants was overwhelmingly positive, with valuable interactions and knowledge exchange taking place during these sessions.

Radio Programmes, Workshops and Seminars: The Chapter is pleased to highlight the successful hosting of Radio talk programmes on Radio Benue (96.5 FM) and Benue TV as well as the organization of seminars and workshops during the reporting period. These educational events served as platforms for knowledge sharing, skill development, and networking among IT professionals and enthusiasts. The chapter conducted a series of talk shows, seminars, and workshops on various topics of interest to our members and the wider IT community. These sessions covered areas such as software development,

project management, data science, cloud computing, and emerging technologies. Renowned industry experts and experienced professionals (from within and without) were invited to deliver insightful presentations and facilitate interactive discussions. The seminars and workshops provided valuable learning opportunities, allowing participants to stay updated with the latest industry trends, acquire new skills, and enhance their professional capabilities. The feedback received from attendees was overwhelmingly positive, with many expressing their appreciation for the quality of the sessions and the relevance of the topics covered.

The Nigeria Computer Society, Benue State Chapter, remains committed to organizing impactful seminars and workshops that empower IT professionals and contribute to the growth of the IT ecosystem in our state. We will continue to collaborate with industry leaders, academic institutions, and other stakeholders to deliver engaging and informative events that address the evolving needs of our members. We express our gratitude to all the presenters, participants, and partners who made these seminars and workshops successful, and we look forward to organizing more of such events in the future.

Monthly Physical Fitness Activities: Recognizing the importance of maintaining a healthy lifestyle and work-life balance, the Benue State Chapter of NCS organized physical fitness activities for its members. These activities included group exercise sessions, walks, and sports events. The aim was to promote physical well-being, reduce stress, and encourage camaraderie among our members. The participation and enthusiasm shown by our members in these activities were commendable, and we witnessed improved overall well-being and a sense of community within our Chapter.

Constitution of Committees: The Chapter constituted and inaugurated five (5) Standing Committees as follows:

- 1. Strategy and Innovation Committee.
- 2. Membership and Ethics Committee.
- 3. Publicity Committee.
- 4. Social and Welfare Committee; and
- 5. Alliances & Linkages Committee.

To facilitate massive attendance and participation of our members at the 2023 NCS international conference, and for successful implementation of the TechMinds programme in the State, the Chapter constituted the following additional Committees:

- 1. 2023 NCS Conference Logistics Committee: This Committee is set up to facilitate massive attendance and participation of our members at the 2023 NCS International Conference at Bauchi State, Nigeria.
- 2. TechMinds Implementation Committee: This Committee has been constituted to ensure the successful implementation of the TechMinds programme initiated by current leadership of the Nigeria Computer Society. The Committee is to do this in collaboration with the relevant stakeholders. The Implementation Plan is currently being developed.

Establishment of NACOS in BSU: The Chapter has, in collaboration with the Department of Mathematics and Computer Science, established National Association of Computing Students (NACOS) at the Benue State University (BSU), Makurdi. This is in addition to the existing chapters. **Registration of New Members:** During the reporting period, the Benue State Chapter of NCS has been able to successfully register some new members. The chapter implemented a proactive approach to attract IT professionals and enthusiasts, emphasizing the benefits of joining NCS, such as access to networking opportunities, professional development resources, and industry recognition. The influx of new members has strengthened our Chapter in terms of numerical strength and expanded our professional network, fostering collaboration and knowledge exchange among IT professionals in Benue State. These prospective members have been encouraged to complete their registration at the national level.

Collaboration and Partnerships: We are continuously assertive on establishing effective collaboration and partnerships with relevant stakeholders, including government bodies, educational institutions, industry players, and other professional associations in the State. Such collaborations are crucial for organizing joint initiatives, sharing resources, and creating a stronger IT ecosystem.

Awareness through Social Media Handles: We are now more active on all our social media handles (e.g. WhatsApp, Facebook, Instagram, Twitter, etc.).

Challenges:

Like any other organisation, the Chapter has encountered some challenges over the period of the report. They include:

- a. Furnishing of Our Secretariat: We are yet to furnish the office recently donated. by the Benue State Ministry of Energy, Science, and Technology, as a temporary state secretariat. This is actually our concern.
- b. Limited Awareness and Membership: One of the primary challenges is the limited awareness and low membership base. Despite our aggressive and pragmatic approach to sensitizing the masses on the relevance of the Society as well as other IT-related matters, many IT professionals in Benue State seem not be aware of the Nigeria Computer Society or the benefits of joining the organization. Some are abruptly adamant to join the professional body. This attitude and lack of awareness hinders the growth and impact of the chapter.
- c. Funding and Resources: Insufficient funding and limited resources has really posed significant challenges for the Chapter over the reported period. Organizing events, seminars, workshops, and other activities require financial resources, and without adequate funding, it becomes difficult to execute such programmes effectively. Hence, we want to state categorically that, the Chapter is battling with ways of sourcing funds to execute our programmes/projects. We really need funding supports and counsel.
- d. State Permanent Secretariat: While we celebrate the offer of an office space recently donated by a state ministry, the need for support of the Chapter for the permanent Secretariat of our own within the State headquarters is still imminent, as the donated office is but a temporary Secretariat. We need our own gigantic structure as State Secretariat, where several activities desire to run can take place, like other professional bodies or even better than theirs. Therefore, we implore the government, corporate organizations and our members as well as other willing individuals and partners (from within and without) to support the Society in any way possible goading at accomplishing this.

- e. Policy Influence and Advocacy: Influencing policies and advocating for the interests of IT professionals and the IT industry in Benue State has been challenging. Engaging with government bodies and policymakers to highlight the importance of IT and its impact on the state's development requires a strategic approach and consistent efforts. We need the intervention of the NCS National Executive Council (NEC) in addressing the State Government to listen to the plights of the IT professionals in the State through accommodative policies.
- f. Membership Engagement and Participation: Despite encouraging active engagement and participation from members, most of our Chapter members have very poor attitude toward participation in NCS activities. This is evident in poor turnout at NCS Programmes. Nevertheless, we have noted that, sustaining member interest, organizing regular meetings, and fostering a sense of community within the chapter require dedicated efforts to create a supportive and inclusive environment. Hence, we are working towards improvement on this.

State Website: The NCS Benue State website is currently down. As we work outing it up again, we need hosting support.

The Way Forward: Addressing the above challenges requires concerted efforts from the Chapter's leadership, members, relevant stakeholders, and most importantly support/backup from the national leadership. By raising awareness, seeking funding opportunities, fostering collaborations, and advocating for the interests of IT professionals, the Benue State Chapter of the Nigeria Computer Society can overcome these challenges and make a significant impact on the IT landscape in the state.

Development Document: The Chapter has developed an IT Development Document for the State Government tagged, "A Digital Benue is Possible: IT Development Document for a New Benue of Our Dream". While the document took a tour through highlighting the current state of IT in the State, it outlines key recommendations from the Nigeria Computer Society (NCS), Benue State Chapter, for the development and advancement of information technology in Benue State. With the vision of creating a Digital Benue, these recommendations focus on the appointment of a core IT professional as to head IT establishments in the State, establishment of Information Technology Development Agency (BITDA), the creation of IT Skills Acquisition Centers, mandatory IT training for civil servants, registration of civil servants with the professional body, sponsorship of civil servants to IT conferences, and support for a permanent secretariat for the NCS Benue State Chapter within the State capital, Makurdi.

Establishment of NACOS: The Chapter plans to establish more Chapters of the NACOS across the tertiary institutions in the State. This is to ensure that the upcoming IT professionals (the undergraduate students) learn the codes and ethics of professional practice, even while they are still studying.

Tech Expo/Exhibition: We have developed a proposal for a Tech Expo/Exhibition, powered by NCS Benue State Chapter, in collaboration with the Eunice Spring of Life (ESL) Foundation, an NGO based in the State. The project is targeted at reawakening the sleeping giants in the younger/upcoming generation in the State. It hopes to feature primary pupils, as well as secondary and tertiary students in IT Quizzes and Tech Exhibitions in different categories with rally and grand finale where awards are proposed to be given to winners and runners up. This is yet to be implemented.

Reactivation of The Benue e-Voice: Benue e-Voice is a monthly magazine of the Chapter which has been enriched to make IT more informative and educational. We must ensure to review its operation.

National Recognition/Awards of Contracts: We feel that the body would be more recognized and its members command higher respect when all arms of the government enforce all the IT professionals working with them to be registered members. With this, regular trainings are offered to their employees in the IT profession. Government contracts should also be made to be awarded to only the registered members.

Death of our Former Chairman, Late Dr. Simon Terungwa Yange: It is with deep sadness that we must also acknowledge the passing of our former Chairman, Dr. Simon Terungwa Yange, during the reporting period. Dr. Yange, whose demise occurred on the 7th of November 2022, was a visionary leader and a dedicated advocate for the advancement of information technology in Benue State. His contributions to the Nigeria Computer Society and the Benue State Chapter were invaluable, and his loss is deeply felt by the entire IT community. He played a significant role in shaping the direction of our chapter and was instrumental in driving its growth and success. Dr. Simon Yange's leadership and passion for the field of IT will be remembered and cherished. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the NCS President and the NEC for role played during his burial/funeral. Our heartfelt condolences to his family, friends, colleagues, and the Society at large.

As we reflect on his legacy, we are reminded of the importance of continuing the work he started. Dr. Simon Yange's commitment to excellence and his dedication to the IT community will continue to inspire us as we strive to carry forward his vision. As a Society, we say, may his soul continue to rest in peace.

Conclusion /Suggestions

The Nigeria Computer Society, Benue State Chapter, has made significant strides in promoting IT knowledge, fostering physical fitness, organizing committees for important initiatives, and expanding its membership base. We extend our gratitude to all our members, volunteers, and partners for their contributions and support during this period. While we pledge our readiness to continually collaborate with the National Executive, we request all the people in the IT profession to identify with 'their own' (I mean the professional body, NCS and CPN). NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT

1. General Information

Nigeria Computer Society (the Association) was incorporated in Nigeria on 15th July, 1996 as an association and commenced operation as NGO. Its registered office address is Plot 10, Otunba Jobi Fele way, Alausa, Ikeja, Lagos.

The Association principal activities include information technology.

To promote the education and training of computer and information scientist, computer engineers, information architects and information technology and systems professional.

To actively encourage research in the advancement of computer and information science, information technology and system, practice and disseminate result of scientific work carried out in industry, military and education sectors.

To advice members, government, other competent authorities and the general public on matters affecting the computing, information and systems technology industry.

2. Going concern status

The society council has made an assessment of its liability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that the society has the resources to continue in business for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the association ability to continue as a going concern. Therefore, the financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis.

3. Significant accounting policies.

3.1 Statement of compliance with IFRSs

The financial statements are prepared and presented in accordance with, and comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Reporting Interpretations Committee (IFRIC) interpretations issued and effective at the time of preparing these statements. In the preparation of these financial statements, the provisions of IFRS 1- First-time Adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards have been applied.

3.2 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

3.3 Revenue recognition

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Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable from members, individual personalities and other corporate organizations.

3.3.1 Membership Subscriptions

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the goods are delivered and titles have passed, at which time all the following conditions are satisfied.

3.3.2 Dividend and interest revenue

Dividend income from investments is recognized when the shareholders' rights to receive payment have been established (provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably).

3.4 Foreign Currency translations

For the purpose of these financial statements, the results and financial position of the society are expressed in Naira, which is the functional currency of the society, and the presentation currency for the financial statements. The functional and presentation currency was determined by the Members at the Annual general meeting (AGM) and this is explicitly documented in the accounting policies manual approved by the council.

In preparing the financial statements of the society, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recognized at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At each reporting date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at the date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates prevailing at the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences on monetary items are recognized in profit or loss in the period in which they arise except for:

Exchange differences on foreign currency borrowings relating to assets under construction for future productive use, which are included in the cost of those assets when they are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs on those foreign currency borrowings;

Exchange differences on transactions entered into in order to hedge certain foreign currency risks.

Exchange differences on monetary items receivable from or payable to a foreign operation for which settlement is neither planned nor likely to occur (therefore forming part of the net investment in the foreign operation). Which are recognized initially in other comprehensive income and reclassified from equity to profit or loss on repayment of the monetary items.

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3.5 Pensions and other post-employment benefits

The society operates a defined contribution based retirement benefit scheme for its staff, in accordance with the Pension Reform Act 2004 with employee contributing 8% and employer contributing 10% each of the employee's relevant emoluments. Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are recognized as an expenses when employees have rendered the service entitling them to the contributions.

For defined benefit plans, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the Projected Unit Credit Method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each reporting period. Actuarial gains and losses are recognized in full in other comprehensive income and all past service costs are recognized immediately in profit or loss.

3.6 Property, plant and equipment.

Land and building, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairments. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent cost is included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the society and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognized. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the financial period in which it is incurred.

Depreciation on property, plant and Machinery, vehicles, furniture and equipment is calculated on a straight-line basis at rates deemed appropriate to write off the cost of the assets to their residual values over their expected useful lives.

Freehold land is not depreciated.

Depreciation is recognized so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets (other than land and properties under construction) less their residual values over their useful lives, using the straight-line method, on the following bases:

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The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount. Losses or gains on disposals of fixed assets are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amounts. These losses or gains are included in profit or loss.

Properties in the course of construction (capital work-in progress) are carried at cost, less any recognized impairment losses. Cost includes professional fees and for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalized in accordance with the society accounting policy.

3.7 Impairment of tangible and intangible assets excluding goodwill and financial assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs. When a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment at least annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pretax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and risks specific to the assets for which the estimates of future cash flow have not been adjusted.

If recoverable amount of an asset (or cash generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount.

An impairment loss is recognized immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease subject to the available surplus in the revaluation reserve.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or cashgenerating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset (or cash generating unit) in

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prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognized immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as revaluation increase.

3.8 Inventories

Inventories are stated in the financial statements at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

3.9 Trade payables

Trade payables are held at amortized cost which equates to nominal value. Long-term payables are discounted where the effect is material.

3.10 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, current balances with banks and similar institutions and highly liquid investments generally with maturities of three months or less. They are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and have insignificant risk of changes in value.

3.11 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the society has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the society will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present value of those cash flows (when the effect of the time value of money is material).

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognized as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

3.12 Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognized when the society becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on

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initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognized immediately in the income statement.

3.12.1 Financial assets

The Association financial assets are classified into available for sale (AFS) and loans and receivables. The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial assets and is determined at the time of initial recognition.

3.12.1.1 Available-for-sale financial assets (AFS financial assets)

AFS financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated as AFS or are not classified as (a) loans and receivables (b) held-to-maturity investments or (c) financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.

Listed equities held by the Association that are traded in an active market are classified as AFS and are stated at fair value at the end of each reporting period. Changes in the carrying amount of available-for-sale financial assets are recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of fair value reserve. When the investment is disposed of or is determined to be impaired, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the fair value reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

Dividends on AFS equity instruments are recognized in the income statement when the society right to receive dividends is established.

The fair value of AFS monetary financial assets denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate prevailing at the end of the reporting period. The foreign exchange gains and losses that are recognized in profit or loss are determined based on the amortized cost of the monetary asset.

3.12.1.2 Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables include 'trade and other receivables' and 'cash and cash equivalents' in the statement of financial position which are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

3.12.1.3 Impairments of financial assets

Financial assets, other than those at FVTPL, are assessed for indicators of impairment at the end of each reporting period. Financial assets are considered to be impaired when there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of financial asset, the estimated future cash flows of the investment have been affected.

For AFS equity investments, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the security below its cost is considered to be objective evidence of impairment.

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For all other financial assets, objective evidence of impairment could include:

- * Significant financial difficulty of the issuer or counterparty: or
- * Breach of contract, such as a default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; or
- * It is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or financial reorganization,

OR

* The disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties.

For certain categories of financial assets, such as trade receivables, assets that are assessed bot to be impaired individually are, in addition, assessed for impairment on a collective basis.

Objective evidence of impairment for a portion of receivables could include the society past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments in the portfolio past the average credit period of 30 days, as well as observable changes in national or local economic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

For financial assets carried at amortized cost, the amount of the impairment loss recognized is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the rate financial asset's original effective interest rate.

For financial assets carried at cost, the amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of trade receivables, where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. When a trade receivable is considered uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against the allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognized in the income statement.

When an AFS financial asset is considered to be impaired, cumulative gains or losses previously recognized in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss in the period.

For financial assets measured at amortized cost, if, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent that the carrying amount of the investment at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortized cost would have been had the impairment been recognized.

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In respect of AFS equity securities, impairment losses previously recognized in profit or loss are not reversed through profit or loss. Any increase in fair value subsequent to an impairment loss is recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of investments revaluation reserve. In respect of AFS debt securities, impairment losses are subsequently reversed through profit or loss if an increase in the fair value of the investment can be objectively related to an event occurring after the recognition of the impairment loss.

3.12.1.4 Derecognition of financial assets

The society derecognizes a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity.

If the society neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the society recognizes its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the society retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred asset, the society continues to recognize the financial asset and also recognizes a collateralized borrowing for the proceeds received.

On the derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable and the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income accumulated in equity is recognized in profit or loss.

On derecognition of financial asset other than in its entirety (e.g. when the society retains an option to repurchase part of a transferred asset), the society allocates the previous carrying amount of the financial asset between the part it continues to recognize under continuing involvement, and the part it no longer recognizes on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts on the date of the transfer.

The difference between the carrying amount allocated to the part that is no longer recognized and the sum of the consideration received for the part no longer recognized and any cumulative gain or loss allocated to it that had been recognized in other comprehensive income is recognized in profit or loss. A cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income is allocated between the part that continues to be recognized and the part that is no longer recognized on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts.

3.13 Financial liabilities and equity

3.13.1 Classification as debt or equity

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Debt and equity instruments issued by the society are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

3.13.2 Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified as 'other financial liabilities'.

4.13.2.1 Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are initially measured at fair value. Subsequently they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

3.13.2.1 Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are initially measured at fair value. Subsequently they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

3.13.2.2 Derecognition of Financial liabilities

The society derecognizes financial liabilities when, and only when, the society obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire. The difference between the carrying amounts of the financial liability derecognized and the consideration paid and payable is recognized in statement of comprehensive income.

4. Critical accounting judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty. In the application of the society accounting policies, which are described in note 4, the council are required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

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The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are the critical judgments and estimates that the council made in the process of applying the society accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements.

4.1 Property, plant and equipment

The charge in respect of periodic depreciation is derived after determining an estimate of an asset's expected useful life and the expected residual value at the end of its life. Increasing an asset's expected life or its residual value would result in the reduced depreciation charge in the statement of comprehensive income. The useful lives and residual values of the property, plant and equipment are determined by council based on historical experience as well as anticipation of future events and circumstances which may impact their useful lives.

4.2 Provision for retirement benefit obligations

The society operates an unfunded defined benefit scheme which entitles staff that put in a minimum qualifying working period of five years to gratuity upon leaving the employment of the society. IAS 19 requires the application of the Projected Unit Credit Method for actuarial valuations.

Actual measurements involve the making of several demographic projections regarding mortality rates of employee turnover etc. and financial projections in the area of future salaries and benefit levels, discount rate, inflation etc.
