2023/08/04	<p><b>President’s Address</b></p> <p>Professor Adesina Sodiya welcomed all once again to the 2023 Annual General Meeting. He informed members that it was a validatory speech since it is the last AGM he will sit as the President of Nigeria Computer Society. He appreciated all for the overwhelming support he received for the four years he served as the President of our esteemed Society.</p> <p><b>Highlights of the address:</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. <b>Collaboration with government and agencies:</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>➤ Engagements and support from government are increasing. Most of our members are facilitating these thereby making NCS relevance.</li> <li>➤ National Population Commission (NPC)- talks are ongoing for NCS to provide technical assistance during the national census.</li> </ul> </li> </ol>

- Nigerian Financial Intelligence Unit (NFIU) has contacted NCS for collaboration in fighting crime.

The President asserted that NCS would continue to build a strong relationship with the Government.

**2. Amendment of NITDA Bill:**

NCS challenged NITDA for not involving CPN and NCS in the NITDA Bill amendment.

**3. Relationship with Chapters:**

Chapters in all the states were now vibrant. All state chapters were now represented at the Conference. Chapter Chairmen present were recognized.

**4. Relationship with Nigerian Association of Computing Students (NACOS):**

NCS has repositioned NACOS for better recognition and more engagement within the public.

**5. Improved membership.**

Membership drive remains one of the cardinal agenda of the administration. NCS has continued to reach out to individuals, corporate organizations and MDAs for membership and collaboration. The effort is yielding results as more individuals and organizations are joining the NCS fold.

**6. Advocacy, Publicity and Visibility:**

The National Executive Council (NEC) constantly and proactively responded to national issues on Information Technology through regular media engagements. The NCS website remains robust and dynamic, with memories of past events detailed on NCS website. NCS is more active on social media handles (e.g. WhatsApp, Facebook, Instagram)

**7. Programmes and Activities:**

- **Technology Innovation Development Programme (TIDP)** is a programme being sponsored by Chief (Dr) Leo Stan- Ekeh of Zinox Technologies Ltd. Five products have been launched from the programme.
- **Artificial Intelligence Robotics Summit and Workshop** was held in Jos Plateau State in collaboration with Plateau State Government.
- The nation's **Cybersecurity Forum and workshop** was also held in Abuja and sponsored by Federal Inland Revenue (FIRS). FIRS has been supporting our events for the last 4 years which is very commendable.
- The President informed members that NCS annual events' planner (activity calendar) is now on the website to guide members to plan to attend our events.

**8. Partnership with World Bank:**

Discussions are ongoing on partnering with World Bank to set up hubs in all the zones in Nigeria. The first hub will be set up in Edo State.

**9. Secretariat and Administration:**

Salary structure has also been developed and fully implemented. Promotional status has also been instituted.

**10. NCS Building:**

The President regretted that the building has not been completed due to paucity of fund.

The full report will be presented as the AGM progresses.

He informed members that Sir Demola Aladekomo has given NCS 4 plots of lands in 2 different areas where Smartcity has landed properties – Ibadan and Osogbo. NCS needs to take possession of the land.

**11. Education and Scholarship:**

This continues. The presentation of awards for the winners of the 2023 competitions would be held during the closing banquet. Tech-minds, a programme created to support IT education of pupils in primary school has also been launched.

**12. Board of Trustees:**

Distinguished individuals have been recommended by NEC as BOT members. The list would be presented to members for ratification and approval.

**13. Ethics and Discipline:**

This is very important in an association. The President informed members that a member from Kaduna State Chapter, Mr. Aliyu Musa Adam (MRN-----) was expelled from NCS for the forgery of NCS membership certificate.

**14. Election of new NEC:**

The President observed that some members were aggrieved by the process of election. There is a need for a wholistic review of the election guidelines and the Constitution.

## President's Report

It is indeed remarkable for me to welcome all our valued and distinguished members to the 2024 Annual General Meeting (AGM) of Nigeria Computer Society (NCS). I thank Almighty God for bringing us together once again this year to discuss the activities and growth of our dear society.

For the past one year, the current National Executive Council (NEC) continued to put the society through the path of growth and development. This NEC remains committed to repositioning and refocusing NCS. We have been committed to enhancing members' interests and bringing all Information Technology practitioners under the umbrella of NCS. Indeed, the activities of the 16<sup>th</sup> National Executive Council have centered on improving the image and visibility of this noble society.

Distinguished Ladies and gentlemen, I wish to present the summary of the activities of this NEC in the last one year as follows:

- a. **Advocacy, Publicity and Visibility:** After a long time, a unique calendar and an introductory flyer were produced last year to further enhance the image of the society. These items have been widely circulated across the country.

We are now currently redesigning the website of the society to showcase all the programmes and activities of the society. There have been significant improvements in content, quality and ease of navigation. This is a continuous process and I want to appeal to members to regularly visit our website for their evaluations and feedbacks. The monthly e-Voice magazine has been so regular to provide information about activities of the society and national news on information technology. We shall continue to make it more informative and educative.

Media engagements have been stepped to enhance the visibility of the society and respond national issues on Information Technology. The social media has been used more than before for enhanced publicity and engagements. The society's social media handles are very active.

- b. **Finance & Administration:** As a standard requirement, the auditor's reports of the society are now available online for the first time. The budgeting system and prudent financial management of this administration are still in place. We have continued to improve on the operations of the secretariat for better performance by providing necessary tools to support administrative and technical services to staff. Indeed, the secretariat is looking like a standard office and very conducive to work.

The new NCS Salary structure developed by this NEC has been fully implemented. A performance-based promotion and annual increase has been enforced. Now, secretariat staff are now upgraded as at when due. Staff now benefit regularly from loans as established in the reviewed handbook.

The cost of running the secretariat is rising daily because of the current economy realities. Since the last increase in the cost of PMS, we have approved two days' work-from-home for the secretariat staff to reduce their financial burden. The huge subscription debt is still there. As at today, the total subscription is place at about ₦ 500M. We have taken some measures to reduce this huge amount. The handshake between the portal and the accounting system has now been completed. This will really improve the financial management system of the society. It is obvious that we will be needing a professional accountant at this time at the secretariat.

**c. Engagement and Good Governance:** In the last one year, we have provided necessary supports to government activities in the area of IT development. Currently, NCS members are serving in many government committees and this continue to enhance NCS relevance in the IT ecosystem. Recently, we have had meaningful and successful interactions with National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA), National Identity Management Commission (NIMC), Economic and Financial Commission. Nigeria Financial Intelligence Unit (NFIU), Galaxy Backbone Plc., Federal Inland Revenue Survive (FIRS), National Communication Commission (NCC), National Population Commission (NPC). Head of Service of the federation (HoS), etc. We are still expecting response to the proposal submitted to INEC. This administration has also participated in many events organized by government agencies and other organisations.

- h. **Innovation, Research and Development:** The NCS Technology Innovation Development Fund (NIDF) introduced four years ago to provide support for young innovators, startups and researchers in the field of Information Technology/Computer Science is still on course. The products developed some are completed, awaiting lunching of those products. The second edition is still on course undergoing different type of mentorship by experts in different areas. The funds use in running the Technology Innovation Development Programme of the society was provided by Chief (Dr.) Leo Stan one of our BOT member. We have been using the fund to run the. On behalf of the society, I wish to appreciate our sponsor Chief (Dr.) Leo Stan may the almighty continue to bless and reward for this kind gesture to our young innovators.

We have never failed our publish our yearly editions of our journal as scheduled. The journal distribution strategy adopted has made NCS journals to be available in the libraries of many institutions. We have now profiled the contact information of Librarians of most tertiary institutions in order to foster better relationship and ensure wider distribution of NCS journals. We have also initiated efforts toward indexing the two journals of the society – Journal of Computer Science and Its Applications and Journal of Information Security, Privacy and Digital Forensic. I want to use this opportunity to inform all those that think we do not have the contact of their librarian should please reach out to our Executive Secretary to provide his details for onward communication on how to send those journals.

You will recall the current NEC has also introduced two annual major events;

- ❖ **Artificial Intelligence and Robotics Summit:** Three editions have been held. We appreciate Nasarawa, Plateau and Kaduna State chapters for facilitating the hosting of that programme. We also wish to thank the governors of three states for their huge donations towards the success of the three events.

❖ Cybersecurity Forum and Workshop: Fourth editions have been successfully executed at The National Open University Abuja. I want to sincerely thank the Vice Chancellor of the University for allowing us to use their facilities for the four edition of the programme we had. Special appreciation all our members at that University for their constant support whenever we go there, they always make us feel at home.

**i. NCS Building:** The work on NCS Centre of Excellence (building) in Lagos is not really moving as it should be due to lack of funds to continue the project. The building have been Roofed, plastered and skidding have now been completed, water draining system and lighting and thunder protector have been installed. The windows frames have been fixed and awaiting to complete the balance of the main windows for fixing. The major determination of the present NEC was to complete the building. The amount needed to complete the building have increased due to raise in prices of the building materials, we still need about ₦650 Million to complete it. I therefore appeal for the support on this project from the notable individuals and organizations to complete the building in due course. The Chairman building committee will be presenting a comprehensive building committee report at this meeting.

**j. Education and Scholarship:**

The 2024 Wizkid and tertiary competitions have concluded, the winners have been announced and will be adequately rewarded. Our collaboration with Cisco and Oracle Corporation to provide modern skills in coding and other emerging technologies to members of this society is still on. We have scheduled other set of training programmes towards the end of this year.

I wish to inform the AGM that we have to receive the 2023 scholarship fund from Jim Ovia Foundation and it have been disbursed to all beneficiaries of the funds. The society is currently facing some issue with the scholarship receive from the foundation that lead to the suspension of the funding, but we are currently working very hard to rectify those issues that lead to that. We thank Chief Jim Ovia for his support and appeal to the foundation to reconsider their decision on suspending the programme. Once I want to use this medium appeal to our members that can reach out to Chief Jim Ovia to present our appeal for reconsidering the decision of his foundation.

**k. Board of Trustees:** I wish to inform you that the National Executive Council (NEC) has long inaugurate the appointed board of trustees members of Nigeria Computer Society as required by law. The last constituted Board of Trustees of Nigeria Computer Society (NCS) is no longer valid and unacceptable by Corporate Affairs Commission because it was done over twenty years ago. Special Induction was conducted for **252 (Two Hundred and Fifty-Two)** Students of MEWAR International University, Masaka, Nasarawa State.



### Other Recommendations to The Nec

The Ethics & Disciplinary Committee (EDC) also made the following recommendations to the NEC to improve the system for better performance of the executives and benefits to members:

- a. **Conduct of Membership Satisfaction Survey for improvement** through dedicated email contact or online form via NCS website for members to make comments for administrative improvements.
- b. **Performance Review of Executive Manifestos with Scorecards** - Quarterly or Biannual Performance Review of current National Executives to ensure consonance with their manifestos and presentation of scorecards to guide re-elections.
- c. **Establish Records of Loopholes in the NCS Legal Documents** through an online form to keep track of existing loopholes in the Constitution, Bylaws, Code of Ethics, etc. for use when their reviews become imminent.
- d. **Keep track of and archive Historical Records of Legal Documents** - Make the historical records of the revised legal documents (Constitution, Bylaws, Code of Ethics, etc.) available as archives on the NCS website as Institutional Memory.

In the year 2023/2024, NIWIIT has been actively involved in a range of IT, Women and Girls focused initiatives, including:

1. **Annual National Conference:** Held from June 25th to 26th, 2024, in Oshogbo, Osun State, with the theme "Empowering Women in Tech: Shaping the Future Through Innovation and Collaboration." The Chapter is currently faced with the challenge of organizing physical meetings due to bad road conditions


Conducted the information technology whizkids competition examination and the fourth position came from the State at the national level.





**NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT**

**1. General Information**

Nigeria Computer Society (the Association) was incorporated in Nigeria on 15<sup>th</sup> July, 1996 as an association and commenced operation as NGO. Its registered office address is Plot 10, Otunba Jobi Fele way, Alausa, Ikeja, Lagos.

The Association principal activities include information technology.

- To promote the education and training of computer and information scientist, computer engineers, information architects and information technology and systems professional.
- To actively encourage research in the advancement of computer and information science, information technology and system, practice and disseminate result of scientific work carried out in industry, military and education sectors.
- To advice members, government, other competent authorities and the general public on matters affecting the computing, information and systems technology industry.

**2. Going concern status**

The society council has made an assessment of its liability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that the society has the resources to continue in business for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the association ability to continue as a going concern. Therefore, the financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis.

**3. Significant accounting policies.**

**3.1 Statement of compliance with IFRSs**

The financial statements are prepared and presented in accordance with, and comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Reporting Interpretations Committee (IFRIC) interpretations issued and effective at the time of preparing these statements. In the preparation of these financial statements, the provisions of IFRS 1- First-time Adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards have been applied.

**3.2 Basis of preparation**

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

### **3.3 Revenue recognition**

Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable from members, individual personalities and other corporate organizations.

#### **3.3.1 Membership Subscriptions**

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the goods are delivered and titles have passed, at which time all the following conditions are satisfied.

#### **3.3.2 Dividend and interest revenue**

Dividend income from investments is recognized when the shareholders' rights to receive payment have been established (provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably).

### **3.4 Foreign Currency translations**

For the purpose of these financial statements, the results and financial position of the society are expressed in Naira, which is the functional currency of the society, and the presentation currency for the financial statements. The functional and presentation currency was determined by the Members at the Annual general meeting (AGM) and this is explicitly documented in the accounting policies manual approved by the council.

In preparing the financial statements of the society, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recognized at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At each reporting date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at the date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates prevailing at the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

Exchange differences on monetary items are recognized in profit or loss in the period in which they arise except for:

- Exchange differences on foreign currency borrowings relating to assets under construction for future productive use, which are included in the cost of those assets when they are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs on those foreign currency borrowings;
- Exchange differences on transactions entered into in order to hedge certain foreign currency risks.
- Exchange differences on monetary items receivable from or payable to a foreign operation for which settlement is neither planned nor likely to occur (therefore forming part of the net investment in the foreign operation). Which are recognized initially in other comprehensive income and reclassified from equity to profit or loss on repayment of the monetary items.

### **3.5 Pensions and other post-employment benefits**

The society operates a defined contribution based retirement benefit scheme for its staff, in accordance with the Pension Reform Act 2004 with employee contributing 8% and employer contributing 10% each of the employee's relevant emoluments. Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are recognized as an expense when employees have rendered the service entitling them to the contributions.

For defined benefit plans, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the Projected Unit Credit Method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each reporting period. Actuarial gains and losses are recognized in full in other comprehensive income and all past service costs are recognized immediately in profit or loss.

### **3.6 Property, plant and equipment.**

Land and building, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairments. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent cost is included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the society and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognized. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the financial period in which it is incurred.

Depreciation on property, plant and Machinery, vehicles, furniture and equipment is calculated on a straight-line basis at rates deemed appropriate to write off the cost of the assets to their residual values over their expected useful lives.

#### **Freehold land is not depreciated.**

Depreciation is recognized so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets (other than land and properties under construction) less their residual values over their useful lives, using the straight-line method, on the following bases:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Losses or gains on disposals of fixed assets are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amounts. These losses or gains are included in profit or loss.

Properties in the course of construction (capital work-in progress) are carried at cost, less any recognized impairment losses. Cost includes professional fees and for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalized in accordance with the society accounting policy.

### **3.7 Impairment of tangible and intangible assets excluding goodwill and financial assets.**

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs. When a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment at least annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and risks specific to the assets for which the estimates of future cash flow have not been adjusted.

If recoverable amount of an asset (or cash generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount.

An impairment loss is recognized immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease subject to the available surplus in the revaluation reserve.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset (or cash generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognized immediately in the income statement, unless the

relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as revaluation increase.

### **3.8 Inventories**

Inventories are stated in the financial statements at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

### **3.9 Trade payables**

Trade payables are held at amortized cost which equates to nominal value. Long-term payables are discounted where the effect is material.

### **3.10 Cash and cash equivalents**

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, current balances with banks and similar institutions and highly liquid investments generally with maturities of three months or less. They are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and have insignificant risk of changes in value.

### **3.11 Provisions**

Provisions are recognized when the society has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the society will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present value of those cash flows (when the effect of the time value of money is material).

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognized as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

### **3.12 Financial instruments**

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognized when the society becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognized immediately in the income statement.

### **3.12.1 Financial assets**

The Association financial assets are classified into available for sale (AFS) and loans and receivables. The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial assets and is determined at the time of initial recognition.

#### **3.12.1.1 Available-for-sale financial assets (AFS financial assets)**

AFS financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated as AFS or are not classified as (a) loans and receivables (b) held-to-maturity investments or (c) financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.

Listed equities held by the Association that are traded in an active market are classified as AFS and are stated at fair value at the end of each reporting period. Changes in the carrying amount of available-for-sale financial assets are recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of fair value reserve. When the investment is disposed of or is determined to be impaired, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the fair value reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

Dividends on AFS equity instruments are recognized in the income statement when the society right to receive dividends is established.

The fair value of AFS monetary financial assets denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate prevailing at the end of the reporting period. The foreign exchange gains and losses that are recognized in profit or loss are determined based on the amortized cost of the monetary asset.

#### **3.12.1.2 Loans and receivables**

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables include 'trade and other receivables' and 'cash and cash equivalents' in the statement of financial position which are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

#### **3.12.1.3 Impairments of financial assets**

Financial assets, other than those at FVTPL, are assessed for indicators of impairment at the end of each reporting period. Financial assets are considered to be impaired when there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of financial asset, the estimated future cash flows of the investment have been affected.

For AFS equity investments, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the security below its cost is considered to be objective evidence of impairment.

For all other financial assets, objective evidence of impairment could include:

- \* Significant financial difficulty of the issuer or counterparty: or

- \* Breach of contract, such as a default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; or
- \* It is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or financial re-organization,

OR

- \* The disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties.

For certain categories of financial assets, such as trade receivables, assets that are assessed not to be impaired individually are, in addition, assessed for impairment on a collective basis.

Objective evidence of impairment for a portion of receivables could include the society past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments in the portfolio past the average credit period of 30 days, as well as observable changes in national or local economic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

For financial assets carried at amortized cost, the amount of the impairment loss recognized is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the rate financial asset's original effective interest rate.

For financial assets carried at cost, the amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of trade receivables, where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. When a trade receivable is considered uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against the allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognized in the income statement.

When an AFS financial asset is considered to be impaired, cumulative gains or losses previously recognized in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss in the period.

For financial assets measured at amortized cost, if, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent that the carrying amount of the investment at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortized cost would have been had the impairment been recognized.

In respect of AFS equity securities, impairment losses previously recognized in profit or loss are not reversed through profit or loss. Any increase in fair value subsequent to an impairment loss is

recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of investments revaluation reserve. In respect of AFS debt securities, impairment losses are subsequently reversed through profit or loss if an increase in the fair value of the investment can be objectively related to an event occurring after the recognition of the impairment loss.

#### **3.12.1.4 Derecognition of financial assets**

The society derecognizes a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity.

If the society neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the society recognizes its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the society retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred asset, the society continues to recognize the financial asset and also recognizes a collateralized borrowing for the proceeds received.

On the derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable and the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income accumulated in equity is recognized in profit or loss.

On derecognition of financial asset other than in its entirety (e.g. when the society retains an option to repurchase part of a transferred asset), the society allocates the previous carrying amount of the financial asset between the part it continues to recognize under continuing involvement, and the part it no longer recognizes on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts on the date of the transfer.

The difference between the carrying amount allocated to the part that is no longer recognized and the sum of the consideration received for the part no longer recognized and any cumulative gain or loss allocated to it that had been recognized in other comprehensive income is recognized in profit or loss. A cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income is allocated between the part that continues to be recognized and the part that is no longer recognized on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts.

### **3.13 Financial liabilities and equity**

#### **3.13.1 Classification as debt or equity**

Debt and equity instruments issued by the society are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

#### **3.13.2 Financial liabilities**

Financial liabilities are classified as 'other financial liabilities'.

#### **4.13.2.1 Other financial liabilities**

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are initially measured at fair value. Subsequently they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

#### **3.13.2.1 Other financial liabilities**

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are initially measured at fair value. Subsequently they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

#### **3.13.2.2 Derecognition of Financial liabilities**

The society derecognizes financial liabilities when, and only when, the society obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire. The difference between the carrying amounts of the financial liability derecognized and the consideration paid and payable is recognized in statement of comprehensive income.

- 4. Critical accounting judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty.** In the application of the society accounting policies, which are described in note 4, the council are required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are the critical judgments and estimates that the council made in the process of applying the society accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements.

#### 4.1 Property, plant and equipment

The charge in respect of periodic depreciation is derived after determining an estimate of an asset's expected useful life and the expected residual value at the end of its life. Increasing an asset's expected life or its residual value would result in the reduced depreciation charge in the statement of comprehensive income. The useful lives and residual values of the property, plant and equipment are determined by council based on historical experience as well as anticipation of future events and circumstances which may impact their useful lives.

#### 4.2 Provision for retirement benefit obligations

The society operates an unfunded defined benefit scheme which entitles staff that put in a minimum qualifying working period of five years to gratuity upon leaving the employment of the society. IAS 19 requires the application of the Projected Unit Credit Method for actuarial valuations.

Actual measurements involve the making of several demographic projections regarding mortality rates of employee turnover etc. and financial projections in the area of future salaries and benefit levels, discount rate, inflation etc.
