President's Report

It is indeed remarkable for me to welcome all our valued and distinguished members to the 2025 Annual General Meeting (AGM) of Nigeria Computer Society (NCS). I thank Almighty God for bringing us together once again this year to discuss the activities and growth of our dear society.

For the past one year, the current National Executive Council (NEC) continued to put the society through the path of growth and development. This NEC remains committed to repositioning and refocusing NCS. We have been committed to enhancing members' interests and bringing all Information Technology practitioners under the umbrella of NCS. Indeed, the activities of the 16th National Executive Council have centered on improving the image and visibility of this noble society.

Distinguished Ladies and gentlemen, I wish to present the summary of the activities of this NEC in the last one year as follows:-

- a. **Advocacy, Publicity and Visibility:** After a long time, a unique calendar and an introductory flyer were produced last year to further enhance the image of the society. These items have been widely circulated across the country. We are now currently redesigning the website of the society and membership portal to showcase all the programmes and activities of the society. There have been significant improvements in content, quality and ease of navigation. This is a continuous process and I want to appeal to members to regularly visit our website for their evaluations and feedbacks. The monthly e-Voice magazine has been so regular to provide information about activities of the society and national news on information technology. We shall continue to make it more informative and educative.

Media engagements have been stepped up to enhance the visibility of our society and respond to national issues on Information Technology. The social media has been used more than before for enhanced publicity and engagements. The society's social media handles are very active, and more are to be done to improve our visibility.

- b. **Finance & Administration:** As a standard requirement, the auditor's reports of the society are now made available online for members' inclusiveness in the affairs of the society. The budgeting system and prudent financial management of this administration are still in place, and we are doing more to improve on transparency of the administration. We have continued to improve the operations of the secretariat for better performance by providing necessary tools to support administrative and technical services for staff. Indeed, the secretariat is looking like a standard office and needs more working tools.

The administration is looking at new NCS Salary structure to staff which after being developed and fully implemented will boost the morale of staff and enhance the quality of life and services. A performance-based promotion and annual increase has been enforced. Now, secretariat

staff are now upgraded as at when due. Staff now benefit regularly from loans as established in the reviewed handbook.

The cost of running the secretariat is rising daily because of the current economy realities. Since the last increase in the cost of PMS, we have approved two days' work-from-home for the secretariat staff to reduce their financial burden. The huge subscription debt is still there. As at today, the total subscription is placed at about ₦ 500M. We have taken some measures to reduce this huge amount and still working for more recovery. The handshake between the portal and the accounting system has now been completed. This will really improve the financial management system of society. The society has engaged a professional accountant who have been handling all our financial matters at the secretariat.


- c. Engagement and Good Governance:** In the last one year, we have provided necessary supports to government activities in the area of IT development. Currently, NCS members are serving in many government committees and this continue to enhance NCS relevance in the IT ecosystem. Recently, we have had meaningful and successful interactions with the office of National Security adviser (ONSA), National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA), National Identity Management Commission (NIMC), Economic and Financial Commission. Nigeria Financial Intelligence Unit (NFIU), Galaxy Backbone Plc., Federal Inland Revenue Survive (FIRS), National Communication Commission (NCC), National Population Commission (NPC). Head of Service of the federation (HoS), etc. We are still expecting response to the proposal submitted to INEC. This administration has also participated in many events organized by government agencies and other organisations.

Some other areas of engagements within the last one year are:-

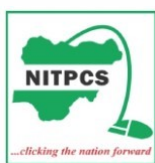

5.1 South West Zonal Coordinator

Preamble

These Chapters have engaged in various forms of activities in the IT ecosystem within the last twelve months covering September 2024 and July 2025.

Please find below highlights of the chapters' activities for the year 2025 starting with the general activities of the chapters:

General Activities of Ncs South West (SW) Chapters

- 
1. **National Whizkids Competition:** All SW Chapters participated in the ongoing National Whizkids Competition, climaxing at the NCS International Conference, Kano in August 2025.
 2. **General Meetings:** NCS Chapters in the SW are holding regular, monthly meetings in the modes of virtual, physical and hybrid in their various States. Some Chapters maximized the benefits of the meetings by introducing seminars for knowledge and experience sharing in keys areas of computing such as Artificial Intelligence, Data Science, Cybersecurity, Data Analytics and Cloud Computing.
 3. **Change of Leadership:** Lagos, Ogun and Ekiti State Chapters are deemed to conduct chapter elections before the year-end to usher in a new set of state executives to run the affairs of the Chapters for another 2-year tenure. For Oyo and Ondo State Chapters, the changes are due in the year 2026 while Osun State is expected to act in the same manner in 2027.
 4. **NCS International Conferences:** All State Chapters of NCS in the SW participate regularly in this annual event with a good number of participants. The programme requests members to register for the conference and they must be financially up-to-date for full participation and maximum benefits. The event takes NCS to various parts of the federation on annual basis.

5.3 NORTHEAST NCS ZONAL REPORT COVERING JANUARY

The Nigeria Computer Society (NCS) zoning followed that of the Nigeria's geo-political regions. Thus, the Northeast zone of the NCS comprises of six states, they are Adamawa, Bauchi, Borno, Gombe, Taraba and Yobe. By 27th July, 2025 all the 6 states in the Northeast zone would be having substantively elected state chapter executives. Since the coming of this zonal leadership the focus has been on making the states chapter active and vibrant. The efforts made so far have yielded results as now all the 6 state chapters are brought on board.

Zonal Meeting

A zonal virtual meeting was slated for Monday 28th July, 2025, which might be the last the current Zonal Coordinator. All the Six States are expected to attend. The State chapter presented their progress status and challenges. Responses and discussions given by the Zonal coordinator and other Chapter Chairmen.

Adamawa State

The NCS Adamawa state is now not very active, there is substantive leadership in the state, however, the leadership needs to do more in making the Chapter vibrant. The focus of the state chapter is reported to be on Membership drive and participation in zonal and national activities. The zonal leadership have sought the intervention of the President and his Deputy in trying to motivate the state chapter into an active one. No report was received from the chapter for the year 2025.

Bauchi State

The NCS Bauchi State chapter is active and vibrant. The chapter The Nigeria Computer Society (NCS) has initiated a statewide membership campaign across all higher institutions in Bauchi State to promote awareness of NCS among aspiring computing professionals and strengthen their dedication to the Society's principles. This initiative seeks to engage the next generation of ICT experts by fostering enthusiasm and commitment to the organization's goals within the state.

Through a strategic partnership with the Bauchi State Government and higher institutions, NCS has enhanced its role in governance and ICT development at the grassroots level. This collaboration supports joint research, the establishment of innovation hubs, faculty development, and industry-academia interactions. Additionally, NCS has conducted career talks and sensitization programs in secondary schools across Bauchi State to motivate young students to pursue careers in computing and



emerging technologies. These efforts highlight the significance of digital literacy, responsible technology use, and the advantages of future NCS membership.

Borno State

The NCS Borno state has substantive. However, The EXCO and the chapter are still battling to gain ground. Also, Membership drive is ongoing according to reports from the State Chapter. Also, as with Adamawa state chapter, the zonal leadership have sought the intervention of the President and his Deputy in trying to motivate the state chapter into an active one. The Zonal Coordinator has not yet received any report or update from the chapter for the year 2025.


Gombe State.

The NCS Gombe chapter is active organizing and executing activities as contained in its action plan. The Nigeria Computer Society (NCS) Gombe Chapter, in collaboration with the Department of Computer Science at Federal University of Kashere and the National Association of Computing Students (NACOS), organized a seminar focused on career guidance and academic excellence. The seminar covered two key topics: career guidance and achieving academic excellence, aimed at equipping students with essential skills and knowledge for their professional and educational journeys. Additionally, the chapter partnered with the National Information Technology Development Agency (NITDA) Zonal Office and Gombyt Tech Services to train 50 individuals in digital literacy, awarding certificates upon completion. The chapter also conducted the Wizkid Competition, involving 30 students, and organized a visit to honor the top three winners with gift presentations.

The NCS Gombe Chapter has fully integrated into the Gombe State ICT Technical Working Group (TWG) and collaborated with NITDA to provide training for students participating in the Industrial Training (IT) and National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) programs. The chapter actively contributed to a public hearing for a bill, sponsored by the Ministry of Communication and Digital Economy, to establish ICT as a cadre in the civil service and supported another bill for right-of-way regulations in Gombe State. Furthermore, the chapter expanded its outreach by promoting NCS awareness at the grassroots level, including engagements with NACOS in various tertiary institutions, resulting in an increased number of inductees due to heightened awareness efforts.

Taraba State

The Nigeria Computer Society (NCS) Taraba Chapter, in partnership with the Department of Computer Science at Taraba State Polytechnic Jalingo, Peacock College of Education Jalingo, and the National Association of Computing Students (NACOS), organized a seminar focusing on career guidance, digital skills, and women in IT. The seminar aimed to inspire and equip students with essential knowledge for career development and digital proficiency. To promote NCS activities, the chapter held a computer competition for primary and secondary school students and conducted the Wizkid Competition with 20 participants. Additionally, the chapter visited ministries, agencies, and IT establishments to foster collaboration and strengthen ties with NCS, encouraging professional registration among staff.



In collaboration with the Taraba State Government through the Ministry of Digital Economy and Innovation, the NCS chapter organized a digital boot camp at Federal University Wukari, training 150 participants in digital skills with 10 facilitators, most of whom were NCS members. The chapter also partnered with the ministry to provide training for students in Industrial Training (IT) and National Youth Service Corps (NYSC) programs. Furthermore, webinars were conducted to enhance members' capacity, and visits were made to ICT directors in state ministries to promote NCS membership. Grassroots awareness campaigns, including engagements with NACOS in tertiary institutions, led to a significant increase in the number of inductees.

Yobe State

The NCS Yobe state has substantive and active elected officials. The new EXOCOs are working to gain grounds and subsequently plan and start their activities with membership drive been the main focus. The state is expected to have full report in the last quarter of the year 2025.

Conclusion

The Nigeria Computer Society (NCS) in the Northeastern zone is growing stronger and increasing its relevance, driven by active advocacy and membership campaigns aimed at encouraging unregistered IT stakeholders to join NCS promptly. All states in the zone, except Borno State, participated in the recently concluded Wizkids Competition. During discussions, state chapter chairmen highlighted challenges, including difficulties with membership registration fee payments, delays in processing registration applications, and slow communication with the National Secretariat. They received assurances of support from the National Executive Council (NEC) to address these obstacles and revitalize their chapters. The chairmen were encouraged to rally their members to unite and advance their respective chapters. The NCS Northeastern zone is gaining momentum through advocacy and membership drives to onboard unregistered IT stakeholders.

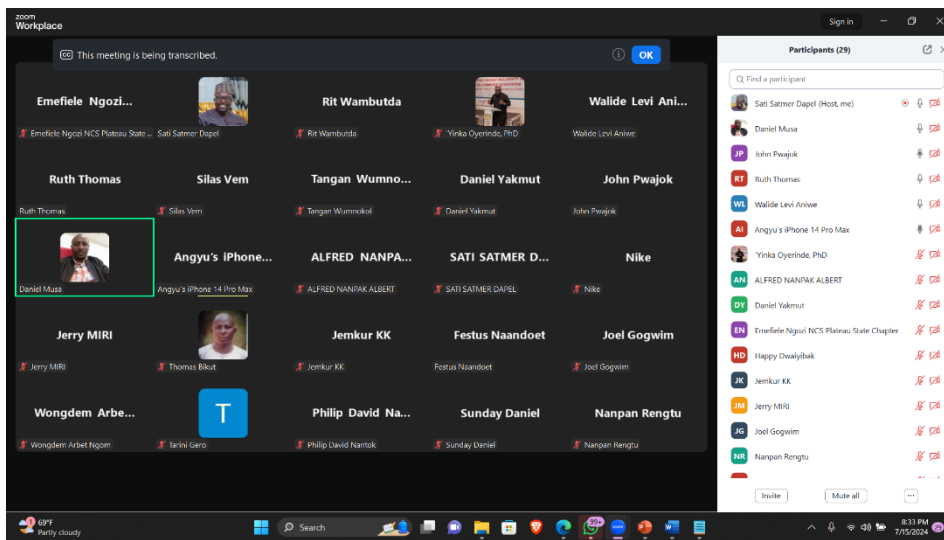

5. Representation in ICT Programmes

The Bauchi State Chapter has consistently ensured the representation of NCS in nearly all ICT-related events within the state. This includes state-sponsored conferences, workshops, digital innovation fairs, and stakeholder consultations. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENT

1. General Information

Nigeria Computer Society (the Association) was incorporated in Nigeria on 15th July, 1996 as an association and commenced operation as NGO. Its registered office address is Plot 10, Otunba Jobi Fele way, Alausa, Ikeja, Lagos.

The Association principal activities include information technology.

- To promote the education and training of computer and information scientist, computer engineers, information architects and information technology and systems professional.
- To actively encourage research in the advancement of computer and information science, information technology and system, practice and disseminate result of scientific work carried out in industry, military and education sectors.
- To advice members, government, other competent authorities and the general public on matters affecting the computing, information and systems technology industry.

2. Going concern status

The society council has made an assessment of its liability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that the society has the resources to continue in business for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the association ability to continue as a going concern. Therefore, the financial statements are prepared on the going concern basis.

3. Significant accounting policies.

3.1 Statement of compliance with IFRSs

The financial statements are prepared and presented in accordance with, and comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Reporting Interpretations Committee (IFRIC) interpretations issued and effective at the time of preparing these statements. In the preparation of these financial statements, the provisions of IFRS 1- First-time Adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards have been applied.

3.2 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets.



3.3 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable from members, individual personalities and other corporate organizations.

3.3.1 Membership Subscriptions

Revenue from the sale of goods is recognized when the goods are delivered and titles have passed, at which time all the following conditions are satisfied.

3.3.2 Dividend and interest revenue

Dividend income from investments is recognized when the shareholders' rights to receive payment have been established (provided that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the company and the amount of revenue can be measured reliably).

3.4 Foreign Currency translations

For the purpose of these financial statements, the results and financial position of the society are expressed in Naira, which is the functional currency of the society, and the presentation currency for the financial statements. The functional and presentation currency was determined by the Members at the Annual general meeting (AGM) and this is explicitly documented in the accounting policies manual approved by the council.

In preparing the financial statements of the society, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recognized at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At each reporting date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates prevailing at the date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates prevailing at the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated. Exchange differences on monetary items are recognized in profit or loss in the period in which they arise except for:

- Exchange differences on foreign currency borrowings relating to assets under construction for future productive use, which are included in the cost of those assets when they are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs on those foreign currency borrowings;
- Exchange differences on transactions entered into in order to hedge certain foreign currency risks.
- Exchange differences on monetary items receivable from or payable to a foreign operation for which settlement is neither planned nor likely to occur (therefore forming part of the net investment in the foreign operation). Which are recognized initially in

other comprehensive income and reclassified from equity to profit or loss on repayment of the monetary items.

3.5 Pensions and other post-employment benefits

The society operates a defined contribution based retirement benefit scheme for its staff, in accordance with the Pension Reform Act 2004 with employee contributing 8% and employer contributing 10% each of the employee's relevant emoluments. Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit plans are recognized as an expenses when employees have rendered the service entitling them to the contributions.

For defined benefit plans, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the Projected Unit Credit Method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each reporting period. Actuarial gains and losses are recognized in full in other comprehensive income and all past service costs are recognized immediately in profit or loss.

3.6 Property, plant and equipment.

Land and building, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairments. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent cost is included in the asset's carrying amount or recognized as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the society and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognized. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to profit or loss during the financial period in which it is incurred.

Depreciation on property, plant and Machinery, vehicles, furniture and equipment is calculated on a straight-line basis at rates deemed appropriate to write off the cost of the assets to their residual values over their expected useful lives.

Freehold land is not depreciated.

Depreciation is recognized so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets (other than land and properties under construction) less their residual values over their useful lives, using the straight-line method, on the following bases:

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each reporting date. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount. Losses or gains on disposals of fixed assets are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amounts. These losses or gains are included in profit or loss.

Properties in the course of construction (capital work-in progress) are carried at cost, less any recognized impairment losses. Cost includes professional fees and for qualifying assets, borrowing costs capitalized in accordance with the society accounting policy.

3.7. Impairment of tangible and intangible assets excluding goodwill and financial assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the Association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the cash generating unit to which the asset belongs. When a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment at least annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and risks specific to the assets for which the estimates of future cash flow have not been adjusted.

If recoverable amount of an asset (or cash generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount.

An impairment loss is recognized immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease subject to the available surplus in the revaluation reserve.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognized for the asset (or cash generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognized immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as revaluation increase.



3.8 Inventories

Inventories are stated in the financial statements at the lower of cost and net realizable value.

3.9 Trade payables

Trade payables are held at amortized cost which equates to nominal value. Long-term payables are discounted where the effect is material.

3.10 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand, current balances with banks and similar institutions and highly liquid investments generally with maturities of three months or less. They are readily convertible into known amounts of cash and have insignificant risk of changes in value.

3.11 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the society has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, it is probable that the society will be required to settle the obligation, and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the end of the reporting period, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation. When a provision is measured using the cash flows estimated to settle the present value of those cash flows (when the effect of the time value of money is material).

When some or all of the economic benefits required to settle a provision are expected to be recovered from a third party, a receivable is recognized as an asset if it is virtually certain that reimbursement will be received and the amount of the receivable can be measured reliably.

3.12 Financial instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognized when the society becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities (other than financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss) are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition. Transaction costs directly attributable to the acquisition of financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are recognized immediately in the income statement.



3.12.1 Financial assets

The Association financial assets are classified into available for sale (AFS) and loans and receivables. The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial assets and is determined at the time of initial recognition.

3.12.1.1 Available-for-sale financial assets (AFS financial assets)

AFS financial assets are non-derivatives that are either designated as AFS or are not classified as (a) loans and receivables (b) held-to-maturity investments or (c) financial assets at fair value through profit or loss.

Listed equities held by the Association that are traded in an active market are classified as AFS and are stated at fair value at the end of each reporting period. Changes in the carrying amount of available-for-sale financial assets are recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of fair value reserve. When the investment is disposed of or is determined to be impaired, the cumulative gain or loss previously accumulated in the fair value reserve is reclassified to profit or loss.

Dividends on AFS equity instruments are recognized in the income statement when the society right to receive dividends is established.

The fair value of AFS monetary financial assets denominated in a foreign currency is determined in that foreign currency and translated at the spot rate prevailing at the end of the reporting period. The foreign exchange gains and losses that are recognized in profit or loss are determined based on the amortized cost of the monetary asset.

3.12.1.2 Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables include 'trade and other receivables' and 'cash and cash equivalents' in the statement of financial position which are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

3.12.1.3 Impairments of financial assets

Financial assets, other than those at FVTPL, are assessed for indicators of impairment at the end of each reporting period. Financial assets are considered to be impaired when there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of financial asset, the estimated future cash flows of the investment have been affected.

For AFS equity investments, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of the security below its cost is considered to be objective evidence of impairment.

For all other financial assets, objective evidence of impairment could include:

- * Significant financial difficulty of the issuer or counterparty; or
- * Breach of contract, such as a default or delinquency in interest or principal payments; or



- * It is becoming probable that the borrower will enter bankruptcy or financial re-organization,

OR

- * The disappearance of an active market for that financial asset because of financial difficulties.

For certain categories of financial assets, such as trade receivables, assets that are assessed bot to be impaired individually are, in addition, assessed for impairment on a collective basis.

Objective evidence of impairment for a portion of receivables could include the society past experience of collecting payments, an increase in the number of delayed payments in the portfolio past the average credit period of 30 days, as well as observable changes in national or local economic conditions that correlate with default on receivables.

For financial assets carried at amortized cost, the amount of the impairment loss recognized is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows, discounted at the rate financial asset's original effective interest rate.

For financial assets carried at cost, the amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset.

The carrying amount of the financial asset is reduced by the impairment loss directly for all financial assets with the exception of trade receivables, where the carrying amount is reduced through the use of an allowance account. When a trade receivable is considered uncollectible, it is written off against the allowance account. Subsequent recoveries of amounts previously written off are credited against the allowance account. Changes in the carrying amount of the allowance account are recognized in the income statement.

When an AFS financial asset is considered to be impaired, cumulative gains or losses previously recognized in other comprehensive income are reclassified to profit or loss in the period.

For financial assets measured at amortized cost, if, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent that the carrying amount of the investment at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortized cost would have been had the impairment been recognized.

In respect of AFS equity securities, impairment losses previously recognized in profit or loss are not reversed through profit or loss. Any increase in fair value subsequent to an impairment loss is recognized in other comprehensive income and accumulated under the heading of investments revaluation reserve. In respect of AFS debt securities, impairment losses are subsequently reversed through profit or loss if an increase in the fair value of the investment can be objectively related to an event occurring after the recognition of the impairment loss.



3.12.1.4 Derecognition of financial assets

The society derecognizes a financial asset only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when it transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another entity.

If the society neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the society recognizes its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the society retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred asset, the society continues to recognize the financial asset and also recognizes a collateralized borrowing for the proceeds received.

On the derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable and the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income accumulated in equity is recognized in profit or loss.

On derecognition of financial asset other than in its entirety (e.g. when the society retains an option to repurchase part of a transferred asset), the society allocates the previous carrying amount of the financial asset between the part it continues to recognize under continuing involvement, and the part it no longer recognizes on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts on the date of the transfer.

The difference between the carrying amount allocated to the part that is no longer recognized and the sum of the consideration received for the part no longer recognized and any cumulative gain or loss allocated to it that had been recognized in other comprehensive income is recognized in profit or loss. A cumulative gain or loss that had been recognized in other comprehensive income is allocated between the part that continues to be recognized and the part that is no longer recognized on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts.

3.13 Financial liabilities and equity

3.13.1 Classification as debt or equity

Debt and equity instruments issued by the society are classified as either financial liabilities or as equity in accordance with the substance of the contractual arrangements and the definitions of a financial liability and an equity instrument.

3.13.2 Financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified as 'other financial liabilities'.

4.13.2.1 Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are initially measured at fair value. Subsequently they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.



The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

3.13.2.1 Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are initially measured at fair value. Subsequently they are measured at amortized cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is method of calculating the amortized cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

3.13.2.2 Derecognition of Financial liabilities

The society derecognizes financial liabilities when, and only when, the society obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire. The difference between the carrying amounts of the financial liability derecognized and the consideration paid and payable is recognized in statement of comprehensive income.

4. Critical accounting judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty. In the application of the society accounting policies, which are described in note 4, the council are required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognized in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following are the critical judgments and estimates that the council made in the process of applying the society accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognized in the financial statements.

4.1 Property, plant and equipment

The charge in respect of periodic depreciation is derived after determining an estimate of an asset's expected useful life and the expected residual value at the end of its life. Increasing an asset's expected life or its residual value would result in the reduced depreciation charge in the statement of comprehensive income. The useful lives and residual values of the property, plant and equipment are determined by council based on historical experience as well as anticipation of future events and circumstances which may impact their useful lives.

4.2 Provision for retirement benefit obligations

The society operates an unfunded defined benefit scheme which entitles staff who put in a minimum qualifying working period of five years to gratuity upon leaving the employment of the society. IAS 19 requires the application of the Projected Unit Credit Method for actuarial valuations.

Actuarial measurements involve the making of several demographic projections regarding mortality rates of employee turnover etc and financial projections in the area of future salaries and benefit levels, discount rate, inflation etc.
